It deeply warms my heart that, despite extraordinary challenges over the last several years, so many have come together in unity with the Holy Spirit, consistently responding with generosity and kindness towards those in need. While the

Saint of the Day—January 28 Saint Thomas Aquinas

By universal consent, Thomas Aquinas is the preeminent spokesman of the Catholic tradition of reason and of divine revelation. He is one of the



great teachers of the medieval Catholic Church, honored with the titles Doctor of the Church and Angelic Doctor.

At five he was given to the Benedictine monastery at Monte Cassino in his parents' hopes that he would choose that way of life and eventually became abbot. In 1239, he was sent to Naples to complete his studies. It was here that he was first attracted to Aristotle's philosophy.

By 1243, Thomas abandoned his family's plans for him and joined the Dominicans, much to his mother's dismay. On her order, Thomas was captured by his brother and kept at home for over a year.

Once free, he went to Paris and then to Cologne, where he finished his studies with Albert the Great. He held two professorships at Paris, lived at the court of Pope Urban IV, directed the Dominican schools at Rome and Viterbo, combated adversaries of the mendicants, as well as the Averroists, and argued with some Franciscans about Aristotelianism.

His greatest contribution to the Catholic Church is his writings. The unity, harmony, and continuity of faith and reason, of revealed and natural human knowledge, pervades his writings. One might expect Thomas, as a man of the gospel, to be an ardent defender of revealed truth. But he was broad enough, deep enough, to see the whole natural order as coming from God the Creator, and to see reason as a divine gift to be highly cherished.

The *Summa Theologiae*, his last and, unfortunately, uncompleted work, deals with the whole of Catholic theology. He stopped work on it after celebrating Mass on December 6, 1273. When asked why he stopped writing, he replied, "I cannot go on.... All that I have written seems to me like so much straw compared to what I have seen and what has been revealed to me." He died March 7, 1274.

Pastoral Council Meeting Minutes

The Parish Pastoral Council convened for its first meeting of the new year on Sunday, January 14. All the members were present. After the opening prayer, the minutes from the meeting on December 17, 2023 were reviewed and approved unanimously.

A report was given regarding the St. Paul Street Evangelization program. Most members of the council have made a commitment for the training program that will begin on January 28. The opportunity was made available to the parish. Only one person has responded.

The home cenacles have completed the first series of learning on the Eucharist. Representatives of the cenacles reported that there have been excellent discussions within their groups and that the groups desire to continue meeting. The next series is entitled Bread of Life from the Augustine Institute. New members are welcome to join an existing cenacle group.

The OCIA formation is going very well. There is a wonderful trust and cohesion among the participants and presenters. The Rite of Election is on February 25.

The Epiphany party on Sunday, January 7 went very well. The food was excellent! We hope for a greater response from parish volunteers next year since this party is a parish expression of gratitude for their service within the parish.


The Dominican community in the priory is preparing to present a two-day observance of the 750th anniversary of the death of St. Thomas Aquinas on March 7. March 6 will have a solemn holy hour with a major talk by Father Gregory Pine, O.P. Compline (night prayer) and Benediction will conclude the evening. March 7 will have a solemn Mass that evening.

The council members proposed and discussed future content for the parish bulletin. Suggestions include Dominican FAQ/charism, parishioner testimony, wholesome Catholic memes, blurbs about the history/art/relics of the church, blurbs about the scripture/history behind famous hymns of the Church, explanations of changes in music program (i.e., what are antiphons and why we sing them now), recipes associated with special feasts/solemnities.

New business included a look at the parish calendar. A parish council "meet & greet" will take place on April 14 after the 10:30 Mass. A parish picnic will follow the Corpus Christi procession on June 2. Council members also discussed points of increasing parish hospitality and thinking about the parish from the prospect of a visitor and what he/she wants to know. Details can make a big difference in the experience of being welcomed.

There being no further new business, Father George concluded the meeting with a prayer and blessing. The next meeting is on February 18.
