PASTOR'S CORNER



Today we celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (in Latin, *Corpus Christi*). In this celebration we recall the primary sacrament which Jesus himself entrusted to his Church and commanded that it be celebrated in memory of his saving passion and death on the Cross. We learn from the Catechism that "the Eucharist is 'the source and summit of the Christian life. The other sacraments, and indeed all ecclesiastical ministries and works of the apostolate, are bound up with the Eucharist and are oriented toward it. For in the blessed Eucharist is contained the whole spiritual good of the Church, namely Christ himself, our Pasch'" (CCC 1324). Every time the Mass is celebrated the real presence and saving work of Christ comes to us and is received by us in Holy Communion. He is the nourishment of our souls and fills us with his grace so that we can grow in virtue and holiness.

For our ongoing sanctification and the enhancement of our personal relationship with Jesus, "the Catholic Church has always offered and still offers to the sacrament of the Eucharist the cult of adoration, not only during Mass, but also outside of it, reserving the consecrated hosts with the utmost care, exposing them to the solemn veneration of the faithful, and carrying them in procession" (CCC 1378).

As a parish, we have a weekly time of Eucharistic Adoration every Thursday afternoon from 4:45 – 5:45 p.m. During this Holy Hour we have the opportunity to dwell in the Eucharistic Presence of the Lord in silent prayer. He is present and waits for us to come to him. All parishioners – in fact, everyone – is invited to come and spend this time with the Lord. His Presence and our worship of him will bring renewal to lives and to our parish. His blessings are available in abundance. We have only to come and receive them.

After weeks of rain and cool temperatures, it seems that warm summer days are quickly approaching. Air conditioning will keep the church comfortable for prayer and worship. Repairs have been made to the a/c system to keep it running through the summer. However, I have been advised by engineers that continual repairs will be needed because of the age of the system. Their recommendation is that it would be more economical over time to replace the system, which is about 50 years old. This recommendation was brought to the parish finance council for review and consideration. The finance council has unanimously agreed that the parish should move forward toward the replacement of the a/c system. The cost will be approximately \$95,000.

PASTOR'S CORNERCONTINUED

The finance council also inquired about other capital needs in the parish. To this question I proposed the replacement of the 2 current confessionals. The current confessionals are small and dark, lacking in sound-proofing features, lacking in ventilation, and inaccessible to the elderly and handicapped who frequently visit the parish. We hear confessions 7 days a week and would like to offer a welcoming and private experience to every penitent who comes to us. The proposed cost of removing the old confessionals and building new larger ones is \$80,000. The finance council has given its unanimous approval for this project.

Additionally, I presented safety concerns regarding steps into the sanctuary that have no handrails. Some people have already fallen; and others have expressed their fears in using the steps. The proposed cost of installing new handrails and top rails is \$25,000. The finance council has given its unanimous approval for this project.

How will the parish pay for all these needs? We will continue with the monthly second collection (third Sunday of the month) for Capital Repair and Maintenance. This regular collection is approved by the Archdiocese and has been granted "exempt" status from the offertory and education assessment to help the parish to meet the costs associated with the projects mentioned above. This approval shows the support of the Archdiocese for our parish and its buildings.

I express my sincere gratitude to the members of the finance council for their financial acumen and their support of their parish. I express my sincere gratitude to all who support the second collection for Capital Repair and Maintenance. Ours is a historic, beautiful and old church. It is good that we make every effort to maintain it properly so that all who come here may encounter the Lord in beauty, comfort, safety and privacy.
