ST. DOMINIC ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



Ash Wednesday and the beginning of Lent are just 1 ½ weeks away. I am pleased to share with you that the Dominican friars who live in the priory here at St. Dominic's are preparing to offer additional times for prayer, devotions, and confessions each day

of the week during the Lenten season. Of note is the liturgical prayer of Compline (night prayer) each evening at 6:45 p.m. in the church. The Psalms and prayers are chanted in singable tones. Compline concludes with a procession to the shrine of Our Lady of the Rosary while singing the Salve Regina, and a sung hymn to St. Dominic. Generally, Compline lasts about 15 minutes. Following Compline on weekdays (except for Wednesdays), there will a half-hour time of a particular devotion during which a priest will be available for the Sacrament of Reconciliation. There are daytime devotions scheduled for Wednesdays, Saturdays, and Sundays. See the flier for more details. These opportunities will help our parish community to develop its prayer life and to invite those who live and work in the area to join with us.

Additionally, the friars invite all to pray the Liturgy of the Hours with them in the morning and evening. Lauds and Vespers are celebrated in the friars' chapel in the priory. There is an entrance to the chapel from the outside across from the entrance to the parish office. This is midblock on E Street, SW. The following excerpts from the General Instruction of the Liturgy of the Hours helps us to understand the importance of the Liturgy of the Hours:


"Public and common prayer by the people of God is rightly considered to be among the primary duties of the Church. From the very beginning those who were baptized 'devoted themselves to the teaching of the apostles and to the community, to the breaking of the bread, and to prayer' (Acts 2:42). The Acts of the Apostles give frequent testimony to the fact that the Christian community prayed with one accord. ... Such prayer in common gradually took the form of a set cycle of hours. This liturgy of the hours or divine office, enriched by readings, is principally a prayer of praise and petition. Indeed, it is the prayer of the Church with Christ and to Christ. ... Christ taught us: 'You must pray at all times and not lose heart' (Lk 18:1). The Church has been faithful in obeying this instruction; it never ceases to offer prayer and makes this exhortation its own: 'Through him (Jesus) let us offer to God an unceasing sacrifice of praise' (Heb 15:15). The Church fulfills this precept not only by celebrating the eucharist but in other ways also, especially through the liturgy of the hours. By ancient Christian tradition what distinguishes the liturgy of the hours from other liturgical services is that it consecrates to God the whole cycle of the day and the night. ... The purpose of the liturgy of the hours is to sanctify the day and the whole range of human activity."

Please consider participating in these offerings of prayer, devotions, and the celebration of the sacraments. They can help overcome some of the mystery of who are the Dominicans and how do they live their life. These offerings also highlight the identity of a parish linked with the charism of the Order of Preachers. The Lenten schedule will be reviewed at the end of the season to determine how to proceed into the future.

Am I excused from fasting and abstinence?

Those that are excused from fast and abstinence outside the age limits include the physically or mentally ill as well as those individuals suffering from chronic illnesses such as diabetes. Also excluded are pregnant or nursing women.

Finance Council Meeting Minutes

The parish Finance Council convened for its quarterly meeting on January 31, 2024. One member was excused. The rest of the members gathered in person or remotely.

Father George began the meeting with a prayer. The minutes from the last meeting on October 24, 2023, were reviewed without changes and approved unanimously.

The members then began a review and discussion of the Statement of Activities and the Statement of Financial Position. It was noted at the outset that parishioners and friends of the parish have been very generous to the parish; and everyone is grateful for this support. Items of note are the disbursement of the Poor Box money. At the end of every quarter, all funds exceeding \$2,000 are distributed to those organizations that serve the poor and needy. Because the parish does not have the facilities or volunteers to offer its own outreach, this is the best way for the parish to partner with other organizations to help them in the fulfillment of their mission which aligns with the mission of the parish. The minimum balance held in reserve is to ensure that we never have to turn someone away who needs assistance.

Secondly, the parish is in the process of receiving a large donation from a parishioner who recently died. The funds are being deposited in interest-bearing, insured accounts for use later for capital improvements.

Thirdly, the parish received a grant from the Archdiocese of Washington for the purpose of evangelization. The funds are being used to train parishioners and others who are interested in street evangelization. The parish is using the training resources of the St. Paul Street Evangelization organization.

An automobile in excellent condition was recently donated to the parish.

The investment funds continue to perform well in the current market. No changes are needed.

There was a brief discussion about the Giving Tuesday effort last November. Again, the members were grateful for the generosity expressed in this campaign. Recommendations were made to make the website and email communications more user friendly. A review of Capital Repairs and Improvements highlighted once again the difficulty of finding skilled craftsmen to do the work. The entrance doors still need replacing and will be accomplished once a contractor is found. The restoration of the Roosevelt organ is still in process. We are waiting for the new console to be constructed and delivered. The organ façade pipe stenciling effort is going slow. There are 27 pipes remaining for sponsorship. Updated sound system equipment has been installed and the members reported with gratitude that the results can be heard. All are pleased with the altar rail restoration, which was fully funded by a benefactor not from the parish.

Father George reported that a new policy from the Archdiocese went into effect on January 1, 2024, that increases the threshold for spending without the need for approval from Archdiocesan officials. The authority level of pastors to approve and sign contracts is increased from \$25,000 to \$75,000. The threshold for contracts that require submission to the College of Consultors is increased from \$100,000 to \$200,000.

There being no other new business, the members confirmed the next meeting for April 23, 2024. Father George concluded the meeting with a prayer and a blessing for all present.
