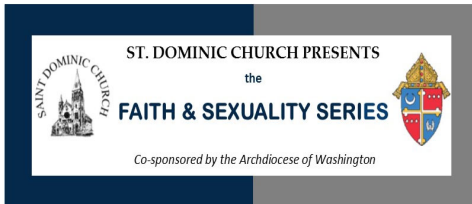

Abuse Survivors Speak



Speaker: Miguel Prats

Miguel is more than his experiences as a survivor of abuse: he is also an advocate for all people who have suffered abuse. He has been dedicated to the organization he founded, the Maria Goretti Network, whose tagline is: “For Recovery and Forgiveness.” He also says that the rosary, St. Maria Goretti, St. Josephine Bakhita, St. Maximilian Kolbe, and Dawn Eden Goldstein’s book *My Peace I Give You* helped his own journey towards healing, Miguel is an example of someone who acted against the things that caused him pain: he is actively changing the downfalls of the Catholic Church and constructing a path towards healing, not just for himself, but those around him.



Speaker: Jason DeSilva

Jason is a devoted Catholic husband and father of three children. Having attended Catholic elementary and high schools, Jason entered the diocesan seminary while studying philosophy at Providence College. Upon graduating he entered the Eastern Province of the Order of Friars Preachers and continued studies as a simply professed religious brother. He is a Knight of the Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulcher of Jerusalem and maintains an active role in all aspects of parish life. As a survivor of sexual abuse by his parish priest, he is well versed in the sexual abuse crisis, the inadequate response by the institutional church, and an advocate for healing and reform.

Bishop Mario Dorsonville and Jeannine Marino of the Archdiocese of Washington will be present in support.

TODAY’S READINGS

First Reading — Elisha left and followed Elijah as his attendant (1 Kings 19:16b, 19-21).

Psalm — You are my inheritance, O Lord (Psalm 16).

Second Reading — Beware that you are not consumed by one another (Galatians 5:1, 13-18).

Gospel — Go and proclaim the kingdom of God (Luke 9:51-62).

RADICAL TRANSFORMATION

On this Thirteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time, the readings describe anything but an ordinary time. They are disturbing and they leave us disturbed. The Old Testament reading recounts a young man’s radical break with the past to follow a new path. The Gospel describes how life as we know it is abruptly changed if we follow the call of Christ. The Psalm and Paul assure us that such life-altering change is possible only because of the power of God’s love. We are presented with a stark choice. To love as God loves, we must leave our old lives behind. We must leave behind not just the bad, the selfish, and the evil but the ordinary, our daily work, and the important, our families, our lives. Loving as God loves requires a radical transformation, not a smooth transition.

"Ordinary Time," the largest part of the liturgical year, is that part of the year that is not focused on one of the two great Christian mysteries of incarnation (Advent-Christmas) or redemption (Lent-Easter). The liturgical color for Sundays in Ordinary Time is green. Some special feasts in Ordinary Time have special traditions and liturgical colors.

DID YOU KNOW? ... There are 15 Dominican Friars living in the building attached to the Church (the *Priory*): 1 Prior; 3 Retired Priests; 2 Parish Priests; 3 Professors; 1 Mission Preacher; 2 Special Ministry Priests; 1 Student Master; 1 Supply Work Priest; 1 Priest on a brief sabbatical; 1 Cooperator Brother (who helps out in the parish). In addition, 2 Student Brothers will be in the community during the summer while doing hospital ministry, and 5 Deacons and 5 "Young Dads" (newly ordained priests finishing their studies) will join the community in the Fall.
