

One of the blessings coming to the parish is the attendance of families with young children. Their presence demonstrates a commitment of the parents to raising their children in the practice of the faith, a commitment made at the baptism of each

child. Attending weekly Sunday Mass becomes formative by example and practice. The whole family comes to worship God together so that the observance of the Lord's Day becomes normative in the family even as it is countercultural to the world around it. At Mass, parents have the opportunity to teach the basics of faith practice and to reinforce the prayers learned in the home. Learning how to genuflect with the right knee to the floor when entering or leaving the pew; making the sign of the Cross reverently with the right hand with the rest of the congregation; and praying the Our Father from memory with everyone. I remember my mother helping me to follow along in the worship missal and finding the hymn number in the hymnal. All this is to say that Jesus gave this important teaching, "Let the children come to me, and do not hinder them; for to such belongs the kingdom of heaven" (Mt 19:14). The presence at Mass of families with children indicates a new vitality growing within the parish and hope for the future.

As a parish, we have the responsibility to support parents in their duty to form and raise their children in the knowledge and practice of the faith. For many years now, because of small numbers, limited facilities, and no trained catechists, there has been no faith formation program here at St. Dominic's. Families with children were directed to St. Peter's on Capitol Hill to enroll in their program. An understandable result of this direction is that families with children registered at St. Peter's and no longer worshipped here at St. Dominic's. Now, as we work to rebuild and renew the life of our parish, the parish pastoral council is strongly supporting the implementation of a faith formation program so that families will find welcome and support. The Office of Catechesis of the Archdiocese is already providing support, guidance, and making available their large library of resources.

To begin, I invite parents with children to make their interest known to Margaret Maxwell in the parish office. Once we have a list, there will be a meeting with parents to listen to their needs, hopes, and desires so that a program can be developed in response. The goal is to have a program in place at the end of August or the beginning of September.



Knowing the names of parents and children builds a community environment. Familiarity each week establishes stronger ties of friendship. Please pray for a successful development of a faith formation program and consider how you may be able to help. Dispensation from Obligation to Abstain from Meat on Friday, March 17th

Lent is the 40-day penitential period before Easter and the celebration of Jesus' resurrection from the dead. <u>Guidelines in the United States</u> require Catholics age 14 and older to abstain from eating meat on Fridays during Lent.

The memorial of Saint Patrick, March 17, 2023, falls on a Friday this year. It is well known that Saint Patrick's Day is a day of convivial celebration for many American Catholics.

Therefore, Cardinal Wilton Gregory, Archbishop of Washington, has decreed that on Friday, March 17, 2023, all Catholics of The Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Washington, no matter where they may be, and all other Catholics actually present in the Archdiocese on that day, are, by his authority, dispensed from the obligation (can. 87 §1).

It is not required that anyone make use of this dispensation. Those who do wish to make use of it are encouraged to abstain from meat on some other day as part of their penitential practices during Lent.

Parish Holy Week Choir: Triduum & Easter Sunday

The celebration of the Triduum (Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Vigil), coupled with the Easter Sunday Mass are the most solemn and prayerful of the year. We are welcoming all members of the parish to participate in the combined music ministry for these celebrations.

- From Holy Thursday's proclamation of the Gloria until the Gloria is sung at the Easter Vigil, almost all music is sung without accompaniment (a'cappella).
- The Proclamation of the Passion at Good Friday is chanted with Presider, soloists, and choir.
- The Easter Vigil and Easter Sunday celebrations are the most important celebrations of the liturgical year.
