In today's Gospel reading, Jesus praises his heavenly Father, Lord of heaven and earth, for he has revealed to little ones the mysteries of the kingdom. The essence of that kingdom is reconciliation and relationship with the Father, through the

Son, and in the grace of the Holy Spirit. Through baptism, we become adopted children of God. As children, we are invited to remain childlike and grow in the virtue of humility, always depending upon the Father and being receptive to his truth and will. Jesus is with us to help us live in this way. He says, "Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am meek and humble of heart." With Jesus, we learn how to live as a son or daughter of God, just as he lives eternally as the Father's only-begotten Son in the love of the Holy Spirit.

Being childlike and learning from God is a lifelong journey. On this journey, we are invited to live in the love of God and expand our knowledge of all that God reveals and teaches through Sacred Scripture and the Tradition of the Church. But we do not have to make the journey alone. United as we are in our profession of faith, the community of believers accompany one another to engage in learning and growing in faith.

The parish is beginning a new initiative to bring Jesus and faith formation to your neighborhood and closer to you. Now, growing in faith and strengthening the bonds of Christian fellowship is more accessible. Small groups (Cenacles) will meet in homes or meeting spaces on a variety of days and times. These meetings are intentionally informal and facilitated by parishioners, who are trained and prepared with professional presentation materials. Each cenacle will study the same material so that we as a parish can be united and formed together. In this time of Eucharistic Revival in the USA, materials will focus on the Mass and the Holy Eucharist.

I am encouraging and inviting you to register for the cenacle group that best fits your availability. You are not restricted to a geographical area. Please see the list in the next column and register through the parish office (office@stdominicchurch.org or 202-554-7863).

Consider this thought from Joseph Cardinal Ratzinger: "Catholics cannot remain immature in the faith, in a state of inferiority, as they run the risk of being tossed about and carried here and there by any doctrinal wind." Ongoing faith formation is the same as continuing education in the professional world. There's always more to learn, which will enhance your relationship with Jesus.



From the Catechism of the Catholic Church. A weekly, continuous reading of the Article on the Sacrament of the Eucharist:

1333 At the heart of the Eucharistic celebration are the bread and wine that, by the words of Christ and the invocation of the Holy Spirit, become Christ's Body and Blood. Faithful to the Lord's command the Church continues to do, in his memory and until his glorious return, what he did on the eve of his Passion: "He took bread...." "He took the cup filled with wine...." The signs of bread and wine become, in a way surpassing understanding, the Body and Blood of Christ; they continue also to signify the goodness of creation. Thus in the Offertory we give thanks to the Creator for bread and wine, [152] fruit of the "work of human hands," but above all as "fruit of the earth" and "of the vine" - gifts of the Creator. The Church sees in the gesture of the king-priest Melchizedek, who "brought out bread and wine," a prefiguring of her own offering. [153]

1334 In the Old Covenant bread and wine were offered in sacrifice among the first fruits of the earth as a sign of grateful acknowledgment to the Creator. But they also received a new significance in the context of the Exodus: the unleavened bread that Israel eats every year at Passover commemorates the haste of the departure that liberated them from Egypt; the remembrance of the manna in the desert will always recall to Israel that it lives by the bread of the Word of God; [154] their daily bread is the fruit of the promised land, the pledge of God's faithfulness to his promises.

The "cup of blessing" [155] at the end of the Jewish Passover meal adds to the festive joy of wine an eschatological dimension: the messianic expectation of the rebuilding of Jerusalem. When Jesus instituted the Eucharist, he gave a new and definitive meaning to the blessing of the bread and the cup.
