FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



Today we complete our short period of reflection and response to the duties of stewardship in our life as disciples of Jesus. He invites us to acknowledge that everything we have – life, relationships, talents, necessities, and financial resources are gifts we have received

from God. In gratitude for his Providence, we return a portion to him for his glory and purposes. I am grateful for all who have supported the parish in the past and are now responding to "Take the Next Step" in the percentage of giving to the parish. All resources will be used to support the parish as it fulfills its mission and ministries.

Rounding out our reflection on stewardship, we have a ministries and organizations fair after all the Masses. This is an opportunity to volunteer or participate in the life of the parish. Greater involvement is needed for the parish to continue to grow and share the responsibilities of parish life. Even if you are unable to be present at the fair, you are always welcome to register. Please consider this reflection as a personal invitation from me.

The OCIA (Order of Christian Initiation of Adults) is off to a great start with 5 participants and a catechetical team of 4 people. We have begun with teaching and reflection on the existence of God, the gift of Divine Revelation in the Scriptures, Creation, and Original Sin. Next, we consider the need for a savior and begin our teaching and reflection on Jesus, the Incarnate Son of God.

The home cenacles initiative is entering its final stage of preparation. Gatherings are planned to begin the first week of October. The inaugural topic is "Jesus and the Eucharist" to coincide with the Eucharistic Revival underway in our country. All interested in participating are asked to **register by Wednesday, September 27**. This will give time for an assessment of registrants and locations; and give time to make any consolidations that seem necessary.

Tonight, we have the opportunity to pray Solemn Vespers as a parish community. This monthly offering of liturgical sung prayer helps us to observe the Lord's Day, keeping in mind that all of Sunday belongs to the Lord. A special choir leads the community in a beautiful combination of simple chant and choral polyphony. Vespers begins at 7 pm in the church. Catholics and non-Catholics are welcome to prayer and the reception following.

The restoration of the organ loft is ongoing. The painting is complete. However, there are architectural features needed at the top and bottom of the 2 columns and at the bottom of the arch in the southeast corner near the shrine to Our Lady of Lourdes. After the architect designs these features, they will need to be fabricated. Those skilled in this work are hard to find. We continue to look for contractors and desire to finish the project as soon as possible.



From the Catechism of the Catholic Church. A weekly, continuous reading of the Article on the Sacrament of the Eucharist:

1359 The Eucharist, the sacrament of our salvation accomplished by Christ on the cross, is also a sacrifice of praise in thanksgiving for the work of creation. In the Eucharistic sacrifice the whole of creation loved by God is presented to the Father through the death and the Resurrection of Christ. Through Christ the Church can offer the sacrifice of praise in thanksgiving for all that God has made good, beautiful, and just in creation and in humanity.

1360 The Eucharist is a sacrifice of thanksgiving to the Father, a blessing by which the Church expresses her gratitude to God for all his benefits, for all that he has accomplished through creation, redemption, and sanctification. Eucharist means first of all "thanksgiving."

1361 The Eucharist is also the sacrifice of praise by which the Church sings the glory of God in the name of all creation. This sacrifice of praise is possible only through Christ: he unites the faithful to his person, to his praise, and to his intercession, so that the sacrifice of praise to the Father is offered through Christ and with him, to be accepted in him.

Church History

We celebrate the feast day of St. Louis Bertrand (1526-81) on October 9th. St. Louis Bertrand, who is featured in the 6th double window on the north wall, became a missionary and travelled to the new world in 1562. He received the gift5 of tongues and is credited with baptizing many Native Americans
