FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



Today, we welcome our new Director of Music and Principal Organist – Denny Layendecker (see his picture at the bottom of the next column). He comes to St. Dominic's with a great wealth of qualifications and experience. Yet, like anyone beginning a new position, he will

need time and our charity as he learns about our parish, our music repertoire, and becomes accustomed to the Roosevelt organ and the beautiful acoustics of our church. Please introduce yourself and welcome him.

Thank you to all who responded to the ministries and organizations fair last weekend. The time and effort commitment strengthens the bond of fellowship in the Holy Spirit within our parish. Together, we are serving the Lord Jesus and one another. If you missed the opportunity last weekend, you can always volunteer to join and serve through the parish office.

The first Sunday of October is known traditionally in the Dominican Order as Rosary Sunday. It commemorates the feast of Our Lady of the Rosary, which falls on October 7 each year. Here is the entry from Wikipedia: "In 1571 Pope Pius V instituted "Our Lady of Victory" as an annual feast to commemorate the victory in the Battle of Lepanto. The victory was attributed to the Blessed Virgin Mary, as a rosary procession had been offered on that day in St. Peter's Square in Rome for the success of the mission of the Holy League to hold back Muslim forces from overrunning Western Europe. In 1573, Pope Gregory XIII changed the title of this feast-day to "Feast of the Holy Rosary". This feast was extended by Pope Clement XI to the whole of the Latin Rite, inserting it into the Roman Catholic calendar of saints in 1716, and assigning it to the first Sunday in October. Pope Pius X changed the date to 7 October in 1913, as part of his effort to restore celebration of the liturgy of the Sundays."

For many years in the history of the Church, this month has been dedicated to honor the Blessed Virgin Mary, Queen of the Most Holy Rosary. She always leads us into deeper communion with Jesus, her Son. She prays for us that we may grow in discipleship with the Lord who comes to us in the holy Eucharist. She leads all her children on the narrow way of the Lord Jesus into eternal life. We, Dominican friars, have a centuries-old association with the rosary of Our Lady—preaching and encouraging the praying of the rosary so that all people can meditate on the mysteries of the life of Jesus while holding onto the beads of Mary in our hand. It is a simple prayer, a humble prayer, a scriptural prayer, a powerful prayer, and a meditative prayer. Generations of people have found help, strength, and consolation through this prayer. Through the repetition of the basic prayers of the Our Father, the Hail Mary, and the Glory Be (which many Catholics learned as children), we find that Jesus and Mary accompany us through all the joys and sorrows, highlights, and ordinariness of our lives. No circumstance or experience is excluded from their loving presence and compassion for us.

Quite truthfully, the rosary should be a devotion that is a part of every Catholic life. Popes, saints, and spiritual directors have recommended it for hundreds of years. The holy beads are not meant to be a kind of jewelry worn around the neck or a decoration over the rearview mirror of a car; rather, they are meant to glide through our fingers with loving attention to the presence, love, and mercy of Jesus and Mary. Learn the rosary, teach the rosary, pray the rosary! Through Mary to Jesus, we find every grace we need to persevere on our pilgrimage of faith, filled with hope that God will bring us to the perfection of charity and make us saints.

Let us love one another and pray for each other,

From the Catechism of the Catholic Church. A weekly, continuous reading of the Article on the Sacrament of the Eucharist:

1359 The Eucharist, the sacrament of our salvation accomplished by Christ on the cross, is also a sacrifice of praise in thanksgiving for the work of creation. In the Eucharistic sacrifice the whole of creation loved by God is presented to the Father through the death and the Resurrection of Christ. Through Christ the Church can offer the sacrifice of praise in thanksgiving for all that God has made good, beautiful, and just in creation and in humanity.

1360 The Eucharist is a sacrifice of thanksgiving to the Father, a blessing by which the Church expresses her gratitude to God for all his benefits, for all that he has accomplished through creation, redemption, and sanctification. Eucharist means first of all "thanksgiving."

1361 The Eucharist is also the sacrifice of praise by which the Church sings the glory of God in the name of all creation. This sacrifice of praise is possible only through Christ: he unites the faithful to his person, to his praise, and to his intercession, so that the sacrifice of praise to the Father is offered through Christ and with him, to be accepted in him.



The National Eucharistic Revival is a movement to restore understanding and devotion to this great mystery here in the United States by helping us renew our worship of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist. This year will conclude with a National Eucharistic Congress in Indianapolis, Indiana from July 17-21, 2024.
