FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



In today's Gospel parable, Jesus praises those who are prudent and at work with the graces and blessings given to them. They are not paralyzed by fear, but confident to use what has been given for the sake of serving and honoring the master. They are stewards of what they

have received, which does not diminish the gift but serves to increase it. Such is the way of the kingdom of God. We see examples of this type of stewardship through the generosity of parishioners to respond to the physical and material needs of others.

Thank you to all who took a gift tag from the Christmas Giving Tree in the church. We have 120 tags that will go to assist 30 families in our neighborhood. The effort is coordinated with the local district of the police department here in SW Washington. Please, if you took a tag, return your gift no later than November 29. The gifts will be distributed to the families in the first week of December.

As the outdoor temperatures become colder, many of us become more aware of the needs of homeless men and women. The proceeds from our parish virtual Poor Box assist people as best we can, and I must say that the people of the parish are very generous. Thank you. Note, however, that we cannot force people to accept an offer of help. For instance, someone who clearly needs a winter coat and gloves will refuse these items because it makes him/her vulnerable to physical assault and being stripped of these new items. Now, he/she is injured and naked. That is just one reason I have learned over the years. We offer when we can and respect the response we receive. Please remember the poor and homeless in your prayers.

This week our nation observes Thanksgiving Day. Our parish will celebrate Holy Mass on that day at 10:30 a.m. only. The following day, Friday, Mass will be celebrated at 8 a.m. only.

I am in Cincinnati, OH this weekend for the 100th anniversary of St. Gertrude Church where I was pastor for 2 years before coming here last year.

PASTORAL COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

The Parish Pastoral Council gathered for a meeting last Sunday afternoon. After approving the minutes from the September meeting, the members began a discussion to debrief on events in September and October. The Parish Ministry/Organization fair in September generated some interest, but not to the level for which we hoped. It was noted that many parishes struggle with a lack of volunteers to sustain and support the life, mission, and activities of the parish. We seem to be no different. Nevertheless, we will continue to seek volunteers through announcements and a personal invitation, which is the most effective way to engage more volunteers. The council recommends that the ministry/organization fair be continued on an annual basis in September.

The October 15 parish picnic was considered a success. Colder weather and wet ground forced the gathering into the Parish Meeting Room, but the BBQ grills were still used outside to prepare the hamburgers and hot dogs. The estimated 60 people in attendance all appeared to have an enjoyable time and lingered for quite a while in conversation.

Looking at faith formation, the council was informed that there are 3 cenacle groups meeting within the parish. Some groups had a slow start but are gaining greater participation. Father George will be visiting each group to lend his support and encouragement.

The OCIA (Order of Christian Initiation for Adults) has 5 people in formation. They are an engaged and attentive group with excellent questions. The period of the Catechumenate begins on the first Sunday of Advent. Father George will be awaiting each person's decision to move forward.

Our pastoral associate, Maggie Friedmann, is hosting an Advent wreath making event on Sunday, December 3 following the 10:30 Mass. All parishioners are welcome to participate. Reservations are required so that supplies can be purchased.

Training has stalled for those interested in the St. Paul Street Evangelization. A renewed effort will be made to bring interested people together for training.

Three parishioners have expressed an interest in attending the Eucharistic Congress in Indianapolis, IN July 17-21. Hopefully, more parishioners will attend.

From the Catechism of the Catholic Church. A weekly, continuous reading of the Article on the Sacrament of the Eucharist:

1380 It is highly fitting that Christ should have wanted to remain present to his Church in this unique way. Since Christ was about to take his departure from his own in his visible form, he wanted to give us his sacramental presence; since he was about to offer himself on the cross to save us, he wanted us to have the memorial of the love with which he loved us "to the end," even to the giving of his life. In his Eucharistic presence he remains mysteriously in our midst as the one who loved us and gave himself up for us, and he remains under signs that express and communicate this love:

The Church and the world have a great need for Eucharistic worship. Jesus awaits us in this sacrament of love. Let us not refuse the time to go to meet him in adoration, in contemplation full of faith, and open to making amends for the serious offenses and crimes of the world. Let our adoration never cease.

1381 "That in this sacrament are the true Body of Christ and his true Blood is something that 'cannot be apprehended by the senses,' says St. Thomas, 'but only by faith, which relies on divine authority.' For this reason, in a commentary on Luke 22:19 ('This is my body which is given for you.'), St. Cyril says: 'Do not doubt whether this is true, but rather receive the words of the Savior in faith, for since he is the truth, he cannot lie.'"

Comments were made to improve the parish website and the use of Facebook. After some delay, difficulties to access Facebook have been addressed.

The calendar of monthly Solemn Vespers was distributed. The Finance Council minutes were reviewed. More time is needed to determine the effectiveness of the Take the Nex Step increased offertory initiative last September. Anecdotally, Father George has seen an increase. Thank you to the generous parishioners.

Giving Tuesday is November 28. Father George has secured \$20,000 in pledge for a dollar-for-dollar matching gift. Promotion will begin soon. Proceeds will be used to replace the rotting exterior doors and to develop further the sacred music program.

The council scheduled its meeting dates from January through May. Father George concluded the meeting with a prayer and blessing.
