





Hook-Up Culture Alternative



Speaker: Jason King

Jason King is Professor of Theology at Saint Vincent College in Latrobe, Pennsylvania. He received his Ph.D. from The Catholic University of America in Washington, DC. He is the author of *Faith with Benefits: Hook-up Culture on Catholic Campuses* (Oxford University Press, 2017) and essays in *American Benedictine Review*, *Religious Education*, *New Blackfriars*, *Journal of Catholic Higher Education*, and *Horizons*. Currently, he edits the *Journal of Moral Theology*.

“Faith with Benefits” gives voice to students, revealing how their faith, the faith of their friends, and the institutional structures of their campus give rise to different hook-up cultures. In doing so, King addresses the questions of students who don’t know where to turn for practical guidance on how to navigate ever-shifting campus cultures, reconciling their faith with their relationships. Students, parents, faculty, administrators—indeed, anyone who cares about Catholic teenagers and young adults—will find much of value in this book.

TODAY'S READINGS

First Reading — Your ancestors waited in faith and courage for God’s promised summons (Wisdom 18:6-9).

Psalm — Blessed the people the Lord has chosen to be his own (Psalm 33).

Second Reading — By faith Abraham sojourned in the promised land (Hebrews 11:1-2, 8-19 [1-2, 8-12]).

Gospel — You do not know the day nor the hour when the Son of Man will appear (Luke 12:32-48 [35-40]).

FAITH AND HOPE

Faith and hope are closely united in today's readings. The Israelites knew when the Passover was coming, and so were not in fear, but had faith and courage, “putting into effect with one accord the divine institution.” In this we can see a foretelling of the Eucharist that we celebrate according to Christ’s command, “Do this in memory of me.”

We see that Abraham, Sarah, Isaac, and Jacob died in faith, although they did not see fulfillment of the promise. We live in hope that our faith will be fulfilled every time we celebrate this sacrament. We too are not to be afraid, but to have hope that our faith will be fulfilled in the coming of Christ.



CHURCH HISTORY

The 3rd double window on the north side of the church features St. Hyacinth (1185-1257), whose feast day is celebrated on August 17th. St. Hyacinth was born into a noble family in Silesia. Hyacinth met Dominic in Rome, who influenced him to become a Dominican. St. Hyacinth was sent to Krakow, where he established the first Dominican house in Poland. — Courtesy of Mary Moran.



PARISH LAY LITURGICAL MINISTRIES

MORE VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

Our parish sponsors formal and informal training for each liturgical ministry on a regular basis. We would like to schedule a training session and communal prayer liturgy for all Lay Ministers in the coming months.

- Our parish **Acolytes** assist the Priest during the Mass (carrying the processional cross, assisting at the chair and altar, etc.).
- Our parish **Lectors** "proclaim the Word."
- Our parish **Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion** (EMHC) primarily assist with the distribution of Holy Communion at Mass.
- Our parish **Music Ministers** volunteer as instrumentalist or as a singing member of the music ministry and support and lead our congregational sung prayers and hymns.
- Our parish **Ushers** are informally organized and frequently our experienced ushers recruit volunteers immediately before Mass (to assist with the gathering of the collection/gifts, etc.).
