



Pastor's Corner



The Gospel reading for the Mass today chronicles for us the continuing ministry of Jesus to heal the sick and to bring deliverance to those possessed by demons. Through these

actions, Jesus continues to reveal that he is the Lord who is mighty in power; through these actions he continues to reveal that he is the fulfillment of the promises of God to send One who will heal the brokenhearted and bind up the wounds of the infirm. His actions confirm and support the Good News of his daily preaching that the Kingdom of God is at hand. Jesus is the antidote to the misery of our sufferings and the slavery of our sins.

A particular sacrament wherein we experience the power of Jesus' word and healing touch is the Anointing of the Sick. This sacrament "is not a sacrament for those only who are at the point of death. Hence, as soon as anyone of the faithful begins to be in danger of death from sickness or old age, the fitting time for him to sacrament certainly receive this has arrived" (CCC 1514). Grave illness and preparation for serious surgery are appropriate times to call and ask for a priest to come and administer this sacrament. Through this sacrament, the sick person has a personal encounter with Christ and is also surrounded by the care, faith and prayers of the Church.

Because of privacy laws, hospitals are no longer permitted to call a parish to say that a Catholic parishioner has been admitted. Hence, the priest can only respond and come to the aid of the sick person when called and informed. The same is true for the Catholic who is dying. We can all express a great act of charity for the seriously ill or dying person by calling a priest to the bedside. It is important not to hesitate; his coming does not mean that the person will necessarily die. We want every Catholic to have all the strength of sacramental grace to persevere in faith and hope in Christ who unites himself with the sick.

Let us pray for the sick of our parish and for one another,
