Hello!



Our names are Samuel Russell and Laura Fullam (soon-to-be Russell). We are parishioners at St. Dominic, and this year we are helping to organize the Proverbs 24 Community (P24), along with Bessie Thibodeaux-Belcher and Monsignor Pope from nearby Holy Comforter-Saint Cyprian.

About P24: "Rescue those who are being taken away to death; hold back those who are stumbling to the slaughter." (Proverbs 24:11 RSV). P24 was founded in 2016 in response to the building of a Planned Parenthood facility in the NoMA neighborhood. Drawing our mission and inspiration from Proverbs 24, we are a pro-life community of lay people, priests, and religious from several D.C. parishes, primarily in and around Capitol Hill and Northeast. We strive to be witnesses of God's grace, mercy, and healing. We pray especially for courage for those in difficult situations to make life affirming decisions. We pray for the conversions of those who work for or with Planned Parenthood and similar institutions. We pray for our society to embrace an authentic culture of life.

P24 usually meets one Saturday each month at Holy Name of Jesus Church in Northeast D.C., the closest church to the Planned Parenthood. From there, some people go out to pray in front of the facility, to simply be a peaceful and joyful presence to witness to the value of life. Some people remain at Holy Name for a Holy Hour of Adoration before the Blessed Sacrament to pray for the actions and intentions of those on the sidewalk. And some people prepare a meal for the entire group to share when we reconvene to debrief and be in fellowship with one another.

Our next P24 Witness Day will be Saturday, September 22nd beginning at 10:30am at Holy Name (920 11th Street, NE) There is a parking lot and street parking, and it is walkable from the NoMa/Gallaudet Metro Station. We invite you to consider joining us. 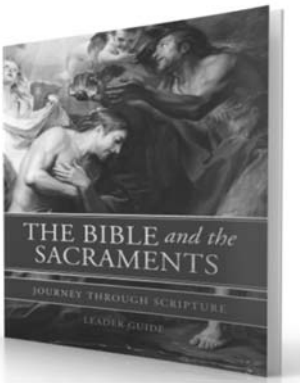
