Pastor's Corner



Happy New Year! I pray that this year of Our Lord 2017 will be filled with grace, peace, and blessings for you and your family. For our parish, may this New Year be filled with the joy of growing in faith, virtue and holiness; may this year

be filled with opportunities to build and strengthen our parish community; may this year be filled with a holy zeal to evangelize our neighbor and invite him/her to encounter Jesus Christ within the Catholic Church.

The greeting - Happy New Year, which is first accompanied with great revelry, reflects the deeper sense of hope that resides in the human heart. With the coming of the New Year, many people make resolutions for greater personal growth and self-improvement. There is a moment of self-examination that quickens the desire for excellence and an acknowledgement of weaknesses that require greater personal striving and self-discipline. These resolutions reflect the innate desire we have for happiness. When we, as Christians, look at happiness, our perspective is much more than just feeling good about ourselves, walking around with a smile all the time, and living a life without problems or challenges. Happiness is connected with being blessed by God; happiness is found in a deep and personal relationship with God. The Catechism teaches us that the "desire [for happiness] is of divine origin: God has placed it in the human heart in order to draw man to the One who alone can fulfill it: 'We all want to live happily; in the whole human race there is no one who does not assent to this proposition, even before it is fully articulated'(St. Augustine). 'How is it, then, that I seek you, Lord? Since in seeking you, my God, I seek a happy life, let me seek you so that my soul may live, for my body draws life from my soul and my soul draws life from you'(St. Thomas Aquinas)" (CCC 1718)

God created us to be happy in him through our sharing in his own blessed life. He offers us the gift of living in a personal and powerful relationship with him. The Catechism continues: "The beatitude we are promised confronts us with decisive moral choices. It invites us to purify our hearts of bad instincts and to seek the love of God above all else. It teaches us that true happiness is not found in riches or well-being, in human fame or power, or in any human achievement - however beneficial it may be - such as science, technology, and art, or indeed in any creature, but in God alone, the source of every good and of all love" (CCC 1723).

Through prayer, participation in the sacraments, and service to our neighbor, we overcome all that stifles

our true happiness and blessedness in the Lord. The path is arduous; nevertheless, the grace of Christ is more powerful than all of our weaknesses and challenges. May this year be happy and blessed through our union with Christ, through whom we can do all things.

Poor Box


