Envisioning a Parish

Have you ever thought about how to envision and effectively organize a parish as a whole? If you begin listing everything we do, it can all seem overwhelming to grasp, organize, and coordinate for even the best pastor and lay leaders. Might there be a simple yet meaningful way to envision the parish as a whole and to see how everything fits meaningfully into this vision?

Fortunately, there is! And we are starting to do precisely this in our parish through our parish council. In short, the whole parish can be thought of in terms of the *priestly*, *prophetic*, *and kingly mission of Christ*. Let me explain.

In the Old Testament, God worked through three main types of figures to sanctify His people: priests, prophets, and kings. Through priests, He blessed, healed, and sanctified His people. Through prophets, He instructed and formed His people. Through kings, He governed and served His people. In the New Testament, Christ fulfills all three roles. He is priest, prophet, and king. As priest He offered Himself in sacrifice, and blessed, forgave, and healed His disciples. As prophet, He taught and formed His disciples. As king, He led and served them. Now, when we are baptized, we are given a share in this three-fold mission of Christ. In other words, through the Church, Christ continues to sanctify, instruct, and guide and serve His people.

Let's now take all this and apply it to the parish. All sacramental activity falls under the priestly mission of Christ (Masses, Baptism, Confessions, Weddings, etc.). All instructional and formative efforts fall under the prophetic mission of Christ (RCIA, the young adult group, various talks and discussion on different aspects of our Catholic Faith). And all the administrative, charity work, and social activities fall under the kingly side.

Why is all this helpful? First, it's spiritually focused! The people helping to count the collection every week, for example, are not just doing a menial task: they are sharing in the kingly mission of Christ for the parish. The person who helps serve or distribute Holy Communion at Mass is not just serving or helping: they are sharing in the priestly mission of Christ. When we witness to our faith and draw others in, we are sharing in the prophetic mission of Christ. Second, this schema is good organization! It's simple, complete, and effective. It captures all the activities of the parish under three categories. It also helps one see the whole and how everything meaningfully fits in. Third, in envisioning the whole, we can become more aware of all the things that go on in the parish, give thanks for all the blessings, identify the weak or missing areas, and over time seek to fill in the gaps and

improve ministries under the guidance and inspiration of the Holy Spirit. So, this is a little taste for now. Sound interesting? Stay tuned: there's more to come!

"Now that May is here, we're ready to open the doors of our houses and the doors of our hearts. This month, let's think about YEAR OF MERCY God's mercy in connection with our homes. One of the most expressive

symbols of the Year of Mercy for us is the Door of Mercy in St. Peter's in Rome. That's one place that any Catholic should be able to go into and feel at home. Now I will admit that the image of a door can be confusing. We run the risk of thinking of the Door of Mercy as an entryway to a church building, and we don't see that this open door is really an INVITATION to the home of the Body of Christ, OUR home.
