Pastor's Corner



Most, if not all, of us have had the experience of being separated from a friend. Either we have moved away, our friend has moved away, or two friends happen to go in different directions from each other. Sometimes, there is pain, bewilderment, and

confusion at the separation. Yet, deep down in our hearts, there is a love that keeps the friendship alive – that keeps the two united as one.

In a certain way, the Ascension of the Lord is like that experience of separation from a friend. When Jesus ascended into heaven, the apostles may have thought that they had lost contact, lost power, and lost hope. Perhaps this is why they kept looking up into the sky. In a way they were hoping that Jesus would come right back so that everything would be the way that it was before. But it would never be the same. No, it would be better!

Because Jesus ascended into heaven and now sits at the right hand of God the Father almighty, he can live in the heart of every person and not just in one place in history. Because he sits at God's right hand, Jesus can be a closer friend to each of us than he could while he walked the earth in a physical body. He is no longer limited to specific times and places; rather he has made all times and places present to himself. Jesus tells each of us today, "know that I am with you always; yes to the end of time." We are never alone.

The Ascension of the Lord is the final act of the Incarnation. An early Church Father once said that "God became man so that man might become God." "Only the one who came from the Father can return to the Father: Christ Jesus" (CCC 661). The mystery of the Ascension teaches us that Jesus returned to the Father with the fullness of his human nature. Jesus lives now, in heaven, in a glorified human body. This truth is the source of our hope and why our life is better because he has gone to the Father. This is what the Catechism teaches us: "Left to its own natural powers humanity does not have access to the 'Father's house,' to God's life and happiness. Only Christ can open to man such access that we, his members, might have confidence that we too shall go where he, our Head and our Source, has preceded us" (CCC 661). Jesus ascension means that the entire human race has the possibility of sharing in the divine life of God.

The life we live now is a life of faith. We are separated from the Lord physically, but united with him in the Holy Spirit. Faith now reaches to the Son who is equal to the Father. We no longer need his bodily presence. Yes, his human nature continues to exist, but

we are closer to him by faith. In faith we touch the only begotten Son of God and become as he is in glory.

We are grateful to Cardinal Wuerl who comes to visit the parish today and celebrate the 10:30 Mass for the community. He is the chief pastor of the Archdiocese and has provided strong leadership for the building of the Kingdom of God; and addressing the social challenges that impact our life and expression as Catholics. Under his leadership, our parish continues to use the Indicators of Vitality (which are being used around the Archdiocese) to assess parish life, listen to members of the parish community, and to plan for the future of the parish. His visit today is an expression of his pastoral care for our community and an encouragement to develop our identity as a community of believers in the Risen Lord Iesus.

Today is Mother's Day - and I extend to all mothers a prayer for an abundance of God's blessings upon you as you are honored and remembered today.

Let us pray for one another, Fr. Schommer, O.P.
